# Bewerley Park Trip 2020



Eskdale U13s travelled to Lady Lumley's last week to play in the Whitby/Ryedale indoor 8 a side softball tournament. Eskdale's first game was against close rivals Caedmon College. Some excellent bowling by Finlay Raine and Joey Kelley restricted Eskdale to 49 runs. Top scorer was Alfie Jackson with 11.

Jim Pierson and Robbie Hogarth bowled tight but Caedmon (F.Raine, 15no) won in the 7 over giving Eskdale 1 point from the loss. The next fixture was against table toppers Ryedale who had 4 district players in the squad. Eskdale bowled first and managed to restrict Ryedale to 84, a reachable total especially indoors with 4's and 6's counting from the surrounding walls.

A couple of early wickets allowed Alfie Jackson and Aaron Locker in to bat and both boys tried to push the 3's and hit the 6's when given the chance. A real push in the 6 over meant Eskdale needed 31 from the last. Locker and Jackson both retired on 15 giving Tommy Jackson chance to swing the bat. Sadly Eskdale fell 19 runs short but the lads played superbly against a very good side.

The last two games were against Lady Lumley's, the first to complete the league draw and the second to complete a 3rd place play off. Eskdale managed a comfortable victory in the first game reaching 88 runs and bowling Lumley's out for 37. The second was a tighter affair with all Eskdale players bowling 1 over and Lumley's reaching a total of 75. Eskdale altered the batting order to try something different but it nearly worked as Locker, Jackson and Hogarth all retired leaving Elliott to push towards the total with 6 balls left.

It wasn't to be and Eskdale fell short by 4 but the boys were superb and Mr Raw thoroughly enjoyed his hot chocolate kindly supplied by the 6th form team at Lumley's.

Dear parent/guardian,

We recently came into one of Eskdale School assemblies to tell your teen all about NCS. Hopefully, they'll fill you in, but here's a little overview of who we are and what we're about...

NCS is an experience specially designed for 16-17 year olds. We give young people a few weeks out over the summer holiday to meet new people, try new things and cover new ground. We're all about helping teenagers realise their potential, by giving them a taste for independence and loading them up with new skills so they can go on to smash their future goals.

As a national youth programme, NCS is made up of lots of regional providers – and that's where we come in. (Hello!) We're Flying Futures and we're your local NCS provider. Last year we took students away from Eskdale School and this year is your teens turn!

Technically a spot on our three-week programme costs around £1,500 but because we're government-funded, we only ask for a contribution. The most you'll pay is £50, and we also offer bursaries – so *everyone* can do NCS.

### Protecting Your Children Against Meningitis and Diphtheria, Tetanus and Polio

Your child is being offered two vaccines in Year 9. These are the MenACWY vaccine which helps to protect against **Meningitis** and **Septicaemia**, and the DTP booster which helps to protect against **Diphtheria**, **Tetanus** and **Polio**.

### How do I give my consent?

Go to www.hdft.nhs.uk/year9form

Enter the School Code 121668 and click "Find School".

**Complete the form** with your child's information and parent/guardian contact information\*.

Click the green "Submit" button.

\*Once submitted, if you provide a valid email address, you will receive an automatic confirmation email. We will also email you to let you know that your child has been vaccinated in school. If your child has specific medical requirements, one of our nurses may need to get in touch before we are due to visit school. We routinely share your child's vaccination information with your registered GP surgery.

# The deadline for online consents is 23<sup>rd</sup> February 2020

### Why is the Meningitis vaccine being offered?

The **MenACWY vaccination** helps to protect your child against four types of meningococcal bacteria (groups A, C, W and Y) that can cause **meningitis** (inflammation of the lining of the brain) and **septicaemia** (blood poisoning). These diseases are very serious and can **kill**, especially if not diagnosed early. Cases of meningococcal W disease ("MenW") in England have **increased significantly** in recent years, and it is in response to this rise in cases that this vaccine was introduced. Last year in North Yorkshire most Year 9 children had this vaccine in school.







### Why is the Diphtheria, Tetanus and Polio vaccine being offered?

The **3-in-1 DTP booster vaccine** helps protect your child against three severe diseases; **diphtheria**, **tet-anus** and **polio**.

**Diphtheria** is a serious disease that can **damage the heart and nervous system**, and in severe cases, it can **kill**.

**Tetanus** is a painful disease affecting the nervous system which can lead to **muscle spasms**, **breathing problems** and can **kill**.

**Polio** is a virus that attacks the nervous system which can cause **permanent paralysis of muscles**. If it affects the chest muscles or the brain, polio can **kill**. Last year in North Yorkshire most Year 9 children had this vaccine in school.

### Where can I find out more?

We hope that the information provided addresses any concerns you or your child might have about these vaccinations. By having these vaccines your child will be protecting themselves and others from very serious diseases. It is important that this letter is shared with your child.
