We do not have a massive knife crime problem in North Yorkshire, but some young people still make the decision to carry a knife or blade.

You may think it gives you street cred, makes you feel big or earns you respect but the truth is none of these are good enough reasons for carrying a knife.

In fact, 7 out of 10 young people who end up in A&E with a knife injury have been stabbed with their own knife. Carrying a blade actually puts you at risk.

If you are found with a knife or weapon you could be prosecuted and end up in prison - in the long term it could affect your future employment and travel prospects.

It is against the law to carry a knife or weapon

Important Attendance Information

At Eskdale School excellent attendance and punctuality is our aim for every student. Full attendance maximises learning opportunities and parents/carers have the responsibility for ensuring their child's attendance is as good as it can possibly be.

Support from parents/carers is crucial to ensure that their children are present in school at every opportunity, arrive on time and avoid allowing them to stay at home unnecessarily, or taking them out of school without authorisation. As a parent/carer you have a legal responsibility to make sure that your child gets a full time education between the ages of 5 and 16 years old. Evidence shows that students who attend school regularly make better progress both academically and socially.



Do you think that 95% attendance is good?

THINK AGAIN !!

You will have missed over **57 hours in KS3** and **75 hours**in KS4 of learning.

ATTENDANCE MATTERS

- 90% attendance means the equivalent of missing 4 whole weeks in one school year.
- Over 5 years this is the equivalent of missing HALF a school year.
- Missing just 17 days in one year can mean dropping a full grade at GCSE.
- Only 10% of persistent truants achieve 5 grade: 4- 9 passes at GCSE.
- 5 or more GCSE passes can increase wages by 42%.
- $\,$ 75% of pupils with 95% attendance or more achieve 5 grade: 4-9 passes at GCSE.
- Of pupils with less than 90% attendance only 25% achieve 5 grade: 4-9 passes at GCSE.
- Schools are open 195 days a year that leaves 170 other dates for leisure time.
- A child on holiday for 2 weeks during term time will miss 50 one hour lessons. Some never catch up.
- Being late 10 minutes each day for one year is equal to missing approximately 6 school days.

Please give careful consideration to the impact that any leave of absence or a term time holiday may have on your child's learning opportunities. Please be aware that no term time holiday will be authorised and any leave of absence will only be granted in exceptional circumstances.

Eskdale School

Year 9 and 10 Maths Visit 8th and 9th of July 2020

Dear Parents / Carers,

We are proposing to take a group of year 9 and 10 students to London and Bletchley Park in July.

The purpose of this visit is to illustrate the importance of mathematics in the past, present and future.

We intend to travel by coach and stay at the Meininger Hotel in London on a bed and breakfast basis.

Our visit includes a visit to the science museum, a visit to the British Museum to try their maths challenge, and a visit to Bletchley Park, the home of the code breakers in the Second World War.

We ran a similar visit 2 years ago and it proved very popular.

The cost of the visit will be approximately £200, depending on the number of students wishing to go. This can be paid in 3 instalments:- £50 deposit, £75 by the end of term (December), and the balance by the end of the spring term (end of March).

This includes all travel, travel insurance, accommodation, entrance fees, breakfast on the second day and a 2 course evening meal in a restaurant.

If you would like your child to attend please return the slip with your deposit to school as soon as possible, and before the $\mathbf{11}^{\text{th}}$ of October, as places will be allocated on a first come first served basis.
